#### Feedback Obtained

Feedback plays an important role for future development and improvement. The essence of the exercise is to help teachers regarding changes that are required to improve teaching outcome. This is a critical exercise as analysis of the feedback data is important information available to the teachers to assess the aspects needed to be worked upon. The students are divided into three groups on the basis of the evaluation of Unit and House Tests conducted during the semester. The time table is modified for these groups and teacher incharges of each group prepared timetable accordingly to cater the individual needs of the students. These groups are categorized as: • Booster Group • Average Group • Remedial Group 1. Booster group: Booster teaching starts with identifying the High Achievers on the basis of the performance of students in Unit House Tests. Once identified, the teacher in charges need to administer the booster teaching while being aware of how efficiently they can present their subject matter in terms of using Graphic Organizers, Quotations, Definitions, Pictorial Presentations and above all introducing and concluding their answers. WhatsApp group is formed by teacher educators and all the required information and required content is shared with the participants. Students are encouraged to consult Foreign Authors' Books, maximizing the use of internet, preparing their notes and get feedback from the concerned teachers 2. Average Group: After the identification of Booster and Remedial Group Students, the rest of the students go through the regular teaching in their respective sections with the regular time table. 3. Remedial Group: Every student aspires to learn at the same pace as everyone else in the classroom, but normally this is not really the case. There are students who lag behind and it is here that remedial teaching comes into the picture. Students who have difficulty grasping lessons in a classroom are provided with different educational strategies like more or refined practice, clarification, repetition of content, and in some cases, individual attention is given so that the concept gets picked up by the student.
